In the ninth year of partnership between SUEZ and Suffolk County Council, we've put 294,607 tonnes of waste to good use generating enough electricity to power 52,243 homes\*.

On 01 December 2023, the site received an updated permit from the Environment Agency that enforces the new limits set by the Industrial Emissions Directive Best Available Techniques review.

The energy-from-waste process is one of the most tightly regulated industrial processes in Europe. At the Suffolk facility, both SUEZ and the Environment Agency monitor the facility to ensure it operates within the conditions set out by the environmental permit. Flue gas is treated throughout the process to ensure compliance with the permit limits.
