

Suffolk energy-from-waste facility 10 year report

Over the ten years of the partnership between SUEZ and Suffolk County Council, we've put 2,771,016 tonnes of waste

to good use generating enough electricity to

power 50,000 homes each year*

The on-site recycling facility uses the ash produced by the energyfrom-waste process to make secondary aggregate products for use in road-building and construction, for example.

The energy-from-waste process is one of the most tightly regulated industrial processes in Europe. At the Suffolk facility, both SUEZ and the Environment Agency monitor the facility to ensure it operates within the conditions set out by the environmental permit. Flue gas is treated throughout the process to ensure compliance with the permit limits. Further information is available on our website (www.suffolkefw.co.uk).
